

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

President's Page

Welcome to the Annual Awards edition ~

First, my takeaway from the Board of Governors' Winter Meeting of February 5, 2022. Once again, our BOG meeting took place on Zoom. We had 41 members attending and our USEF representative, Nicole Zerbee sat in as well. All regions were represented, some by the Regional Governor, some by the Region Chair, and some regions had both representatives present. We could not all fit on one screen, and it was hard to tell who was speaking at times, but the body was orderly and collegial throughout. Every committee and every region provided reports ahead of time so our Board members and interested others could review them prior to the meeting. The Region reports, which were all very informative, will be printed in the magazine. For anyone interested in the remaining reports, they will be included with the minutes on the website. The minutes are also printed in this edition of the magazine.

There is an interest in our ACPS history as demonstrated by the requests for the *The American Connemara Pony Society, A History From 1985-1999*, by Pat Lightbody. Sally Oxnard will request another printing. We do need help getting more of our ACPS history on paper. We have much history in the pages of the magazines over the years, it's available to be compiled. Would love to hear some suggestions for next steps.

Lots of good conversation about the website. Members appeared in agreement that we want to make the website easy to use for newcomers (and the rest of us). The highest traffic to the website is the stallion ads and then the classifieds. The BOG voted to make the classifieds free to members for registered ponies. The ads can provide more information than a Face Book post and your social media ad can be linked to the webpage ad. USEF might even link our classifieds to the USEF Connemara page. Our Internet Chair asked for help from members and got some volunteers to fill some important roles!



In February 2018, the Protecting Young Victims from Sexual Abuse and Safe Sport Authorization Act of 2017 was signed into law. Among the provisions in the law was Congressional authorization for the U.S. Center for SafeSport to ensure athletes could report allegations of abuse to an independent entity for investigation and resolution. The Center works with National Governing Bodies (NGBs), including US Equestrian and other Olympic disciplines, to enforce the SafeSport Code as well as the federal Safe Sport Act, both of which are aimed at protecting athletes from abuse. The Center ensures all NGBs follow the strictest standards for child abuse prevention and detection. As an affiliate of the United States Equestrian or USEF, ACPS is obligated to ensure our BOG, Region Chairs, Inspectors, and competitors comply with the Safe Sport training expectations. Many ACPS members already meet this requirement as a prerequisite to participating in recognized competitions. The training is available on the USEF website and if you are in one of these categories, I will send you the information explaining the process and how to access the training. USEF tracks our compliance, and you can print your certificate as well. The ACPS Code of Conduct and Conflict of Interest Statement was also reviewed and after deliberation, the BOG voted to make signing, or digitally agreeing, mandatory for all ACPS members. You will be seeing this form in your email, and we appreciate everyone making the effort to sign and return in a timely fashion.

The Inspection Committee treated us all to a premiere viewing of one its completed training videos. This brief delight was well worth the price of admission. The committee is on its way to producing a series of videos that will be a part of the training curriculum for new Inspectors. A huge thank you to all who attended the meeting and huger thank yous to Heather Magnan for hosting us on Zoom, and Kathy Nebel for excellent preparatory organization and minutes in her inaugural role as secretary.

No corrections or additions were submitted to the minutes of the September 25, 2021 BOG meeting. ***The meeting minutes were approved as printed.***

Regional Reports

Finance - Cathy Blackmon and Report of the Treasurer
The Finance reports were submitted and distributed before the meeting. Cathy said the association is in good health financially and investments have done well during the pandemic. ***The Finance Committee and Treasurer report were approved.***

Promotions - Heather Magnan, Policies & Procedures
Heather met with Marynell and Sharon and formulated a plan to best promote news items and awards using the website, internet and magazine. A system for promoting awards that will make Sally's life easier is planned requiring less duplicate work. The Promotions report will be put in the record. Policy and Procedures are still being edited.

History Project - Linda Haines
Linda thanked Sally for working on the history project. Sally and her aunt put together a book that covers 14 years of the ACPS. Still, there are a lot of years are not covered. We have resources in people and records. Members are needed take on a chapter, a decade, editorship, etc. to keep the project moving. We risk losing information from our senior members if the project falters. Documentation from 1956-1985 and after 1999 is needed. The book was introduced. With shipping it costs about \$13. A few copies are left and it may go into another print. Requests for copies should go to Sally Oxnard.

Inspections - Kathy Sparks
Kathy touched on the items in her report and addendum. She outlined the dilemma with inspections: registrations are increasing so there is a young population of ponies to inspect but there is not a large volume in the age that is appropriate for inspections. It is hard

to find a location with the recommended 10 ponies for inspection. The cost of travel has greatly increased and the reliability of travel has decreased. The Inspection Committee looked at the cost of inspections and the income produced. The last time the fees changed was in 2002. The committee made a recommendation to increase the fee per the schedule submitted to the BOG:

The motion to approve the new fees was approved. The nomination form with new fees will be in the next magazine.

The inspection Committee has been working on a curriculum for the training of inspectors in the future. There is an online learning program that will eventually be accessible to everyone interested in Connemaras. A prototype of the website being developed was shared at the meeting.

The website will eventually be linked to the ACPS website. Modules include Type, Movement, Conformation, Temperament and Wonderful Pony Stories. Both American and Irish experts are used to present the lessons. There will be a core module and a quiz component which can be graded. The core module includes materials used to train inspectors and judges.

A prototype of the website being developed was shared at the meeting. A video with Caroline Nesbitt, which is part of the training, was aired for the group. The new curriculum was well received by meeting participants.

Insurance for Inspectors is being investigated to determine the best way to provide coverage. The liability waiver is being updated to add language that by signing, participants accept the results of inspections.

Internet - Sharon Jantzen
Sharon, Heather and Marynell met to talk about how to streamline touch points for people to get information. The website needs more of a "newbie" focus so terms are defined. The Facebook page needs a "blast." More in-depth information will be in the magazine.

Sharon is working on a calendar for the year to determine what gets published where. Two stories from the magazine will be on the website, a month at a time, after the magazine is published.

A questionnaire for award winners is being developed to get their stories for publication. It was recommended that there be additional resources for viewers to look into conformation.

The biggest draws to the website, primarily by new visitors, are stallion ads, region information and the classifieds. The Internet Committee would like to grow the the classified advertisements. They are not a money maker, but they do draw people to the website.

Motion to make ACPS website Classified ads free to ACPS members for registered ponies. Motion passed. Sharon will take this back to committee to implement. A classifieds manager will need to verify the owner is a member of ACPS and the pony is registered.

Sharon is working to streamline the main menu on the website. Currently there are 13 menu items at the top of the page. Three buckets are proposed: Get to know the Connemara pony: Connemara ownership info: Jump to quick access

Sharon will try some of these changes. Heather will provide a second set of eyes and others attending the meeting offered to help. It was suggested that testimonials from well-known riders like Karen O'Connor, Lendon Gray and Jessica Springsteen, who got

their starts on Connemaras be published. The group discussed scrubbing the website of personal email addresses to avoid scams. Some of the Region Chairs are creating google email accounts for their regions that can move with the chair. Sharon and the region chairs can decide how to handle email contacts on the website. A switchboard operator may be needed.

Awards - Marilyn Cheek, Sally Oxnard

Awards presented motions for Distance awards and Working Equitation:

Distance Awards

- 1) In our AA program, Add ECTRA and SEDRA and any competitive trail association that has bylaws and a charter as recognized competitions
- 2) Points for placing remain the same, and best conditioned award the same
- 3) Points for finishing a ride will be:
5 points for 10 to 19 miles
10 points for 20 to 49
20 points for 50 to 99
30 points for 100
- 4) We will contact the AERC before Feb 1 to agree to work with them to offer a Breed Award to the best registered Connemara and Connemara halfbred of the year in their competitions. Qualifications will be developed by us using other breed awards as a reference (Morgan etc) Award may be a certificate or ribbon etc.

Working Equitation points

In addition to, or in the absence of, points earned for placing at USAWE recognized competitions:

5 points will be awarded for completing at Introductory
10 points will be awarded for completing at Novice
15 points will be awarded for completing at Intermediate
20 points will be awarded for completing at Master
In addition to points awarded for total final placing, points may be earned as follows:

Champion at Recognized Show: 12

Champion at Unrecognized Show: 6

Reserve Champion at Recognized Show: 10

Reserve Champion at Unrecognized Show: 5

Motion to accept the recommendations for Distance Awards and Working Equitation Points presented by the Awards Committee. Motion passed.

Insurance - Becky Jordan - Insurance coverage for clinicians was discussed.

Motion that Regions be required to have their events on the ACPS calendar by March 1 so that events are covered by ACPS insurance. Motion passed.

March 9 is the renewal date for insurance, so the calendar will run March 1 to April 31.

Motion that Regions be required to ensure their clinicians have professional liability coverage. Motion passed.

If a clinician is a member of ACPS, the clinician would be covered under our general liability policy. Clinicians can be covered for professional liability by the ACPS policy for \$115.

Code of Conduct

The Code of Conduct was originally set up for all members to sign when they applied for membership.

Motion to require signature of the Code of Conduct by all members. Motion passed.

Suzanne, Linda, Becky and Sharon will figure out next steps. Becky will track signatures.

Safe Sport

Safe Sport is a USEF training program. Our insurance company wants to ensure we are in compliance. Board of Governors, Region Chairs and Inspectors should complete the course. Competing USEF members are already doing it.

The USEF Marketing team has passed along a process which will allow our non-USEF member Board of Governors, Region Chairs and Inspectors to take the course. Information will be sent to them.

In additional business, Sally reported that Pat Lightbody's library is available for loan through Mary Lightbody. Additionally, books are being scanned for the ACPS library. Linda is looking for copies of Shrouded in Mist and Out of the Mist by Pay Lyne for digitizing. The books would need to be donated as a hard copy needs to be retained for the digital library.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:48 PM



Connemara of the Year 2021
HOTY Eventing, 4th Place

What an honor to have Special awarded the ACPS 2021 Connemara of the Year! According to our Awards Policy, Connemara of the Year is primarily for breed ambassadorship, getting the Connemara noticed. This is more than performance, although performance definitely gets our ponies noticed in the horse world. This pony is my heart, he is my soul. Special has taken me places I never dreamed of. He has given me wings to fly, he has taught me about trust, goodness, and reminds me to always be aware of the beauty that surrounds us.

We were an unlikely partnership. My **unknowing** and sweet husband noticed how much time I spent at the barn with my daughter, Elliott and her first Connemara, Pooka Princess which prompted him to say, "Why don't you get one?"

Famous last words!

My search began and I visited Sally Eyles-Goldfarb's farm in Franklin, TN. I knew the moment I saw him, there was a connection. It was his deep soulful eye. He had so much talent, but was not trusting of most humans. I had grown up on a Connemara, Arthur's Lassie Boy, in Germantown, TN, riding bareback all over our town with my friends. We were on our horses all day, every day. So you have the picture, mother of two, only rode bareback her whole life, and extremely talented, yet

not so trusting pony. Sally mentioned, he may not be the one for me, maybe something "a little bit quieter?". The connection was undeniable. I am so very grateful that Sally blessed our partnership, against her better judgement at the time because we were meant to be.

Special and I just started doing stuff. Trail rides, led to jumping all the hunt fences, logs, etc. in the Wayne DuPage Conservancy and the cross country field in Wayne, IL (Lamplight). An old friend told me to "get off the porch" and start competing as I was already going to horse trials with Elliott anyway. So our journey began. I bought Special when he was coming nine. We did our first horse trial when he was eleven. We both were hooked. He loved running across country and jumping. He ran most of his career barefoot. I used to laugh that all I needed was a bridle and a saddle and we were set. He has qualified for the American Eventing Championships 15 years in a row. Special LOVES to compete. This pony! Incredibly athletic, SMART as a whip. His scope, his brain, and athleticism got everyone's attention. In our early years, I was in a clinic with dressage rider, Pierre St Jacques and all of a sudden, Pierre stops the clinic and says to all the women riding the fancy warmbloods, "Unless you are emotionally attached to what you are sitting on, sell it and get yourself one of these (as he points to Special!!!). He can do everything you want and more." I was so proud of Special as I sat on a pony amongst the giants of dressage. Pierre has been a fan of the Connemara since.

Years later, Elliott and I decided to take some lessons with Jenny Brannigan, 5* event rider. She announced when we showed up for a stadium lesson that today we would be counting strides. I had never counted strides. I only walked the combinations in the show jump and xc courses to make sure I knew how to come in to the jump, Special did the rest. By this time, Special and I were doing 1.10 jumpers, Preliminary/ Training eventing.

I said to Jenny, “Are you kidding? He is 19, I am 53 and we have never counted strides.”

Well, I learned to count strides that day! But at the end of the lesson she was so impressed with Special because he literally flicked his ears as if he was counting and boom, perfect horse strides every time! Jenny asked to clone him that day and she still stops to have a notice of him when we see each other as do so many trainers, riders, and fans where ever he and I go. Another Ocala, FL trainer used to ask me when I was going to retire Special about this time (age 19). She has since stopped asking me when she sees him jump the rounds! I giggle to myself when I see her these days.

Special is nicknamed, The Wonder Pony, by my coach in NC because he always exceeds the challenge put before him. Emeraude asked to borrow Special to earn her USDF Bronze medal when he was 22. I thought that was a brilliant idea, because she would put the buttons on him and maybe I could learn to push them! She rode him six times, took him to a show, rode four third level classes and earned four qualifying scores. One of my proudest moments was earning my USDF Bronze on my Special Pony too!

Special’s can do attitude, incredible scope and athleticism has allowed him to continue to compete up to the age of 26. Which is why he was noticed by Farnam Horse Products and Equus Magazine for their joint advertising campaign called SeniorHorse, SeniorProud when he was 24 years old. He was featured in a Farnam advertisement that ran in many National magazines. He was given the title on his gift wool cooler of “Spokeshorse”, I did not know that was a thing!



Special was included in *US Equestrian Magazine* article about senior horses still competing the same year. And USEA AEC wrap up article as one of the oldest horses at Championships where he was eighth in his division. My vet, Dr. Jack Shuler, said that there were a lot of old horses out there, but not a lot of old horses doing what Special was doing. Special pony is not ready for a rocking chair. He is still bouncing in the xc start box, prancing into the stadium arena at 26. He is a competitor and loves it. I truly think he would jump the rounds without me...he can count the strides for sure!!

Our next journey, which is another story in the making, is his recovery from a severe superficial digital flexor tendon injury in August, 2021 as we were competing on xc at a horse trial near Tryon, NC as our prep for AEC’s. But AGAIN, Special is remarkable in his healing, and folks that have had little or no experience with the Connemara are witnessing this amazing pony beat the diagnosis. The veterinary team at Tryon Equine Hospital is amazed, almost disbelief at his healing, the same with my at-home veterinary and support team. Special’s attitude is remarkable. I can see in his eye that he and I have more to come. It must be a testament to the Connemara bloodlines. Hideaway’s Special Delivery is a treasure in this world and as Elliott always says, he gets all the cute pony points! Thank you ACPS for honoring my amazing Special Pony.





2019 Halfbred Connemara of the Year Award Kynnymont Gunsmoke's Gideon (*Gun Smoke x Kynnymont Tara)

Pam Liddell, breeder and owner of Gideon, applied for, and won the 2019 Connemara of the Year award, but an article about him was not written until now. Pam used the Award application form to write her article, so it appears as a Q & A. We are glad to read all the back story on this Connemara halfbred.

What has this pony done in the past year to bring positive attention to the breed?

In August of 2018, Gideon competed in the US Dressage Festival of Champions in Developing Grand Prix. In order to compete there, a horse must qualify by being among the top 15 horses at that level in the country. Gideon came out 6th in the nation at that competition. Next he competed at Dressage at Devon in September, winning both the Intermediaire A and the Intermediaire B classes. In October, he competed at the Region 1 GAIG Championships in Lexington, VA and placed 4th at Intermediaire 2. He started the 2019 winter season in Wellington, FL with two regular Grand Prix classes, and then graduated to his first CDI Grand Prix. He is now competing exclusively at CDI Grand Prix, the top level of international dressage (excluding the Olympics and other World competitions). He competes in big venues with

lots of spectators---Wellington, FL in the winter, and Tryon, NC, Lexington, VA, and Dressage at Devon the rest of the year. He did the CDI Grand Prix and CDI Grand Prix Musical Freestyle twice in Wellington, in February and March, and then in Tryon in April, winning 3rd place overall, which entitled him to be in the victory lap. In his CDI-GP classes, he is competing against horses and riders that have competed in multiple Olympics, at the WEG, at the Pan Am Games, etc., and that have years of Grand Prix experience. Gideon has just started competing at Grand Prix. He is a little guy among giants, in both size and competitive experience, and yet he holds his own with a character that shines through in his performances. You can see that he is proud of himself and thinks he is pretty special. He is a crowd pleaser. His musical freestyle elicits laughter and wild clapping in a large stadium full of spectators. He struts his stuff in the award ceremonies surrounded by massive warmbloods. With his unique coloring (dark buckskin) and his petite stature, he is hard not to notice in the crowd. His trainer, JJ Tate, has a substantial Facebook following, and she posts regularly about the "Super Pony." He has fans all over the country. When I introduce myself, the response is often, "Oh, you are the Super Pony's Mom."

Gideon Continued ~

Why should the ACPS be especially proud of this pony's achievements in the past year?

The ACPS should be proud that a 3/4-Connemara is performing successfully at the top level of the international dressage world in the US---CDI Grand Prix in the large arenas of Wellington, FL, Tryon, NC, Lexington, VA, and Dressage at Devon. He is seen by hundreds of people at each show, and he stands out and is noticed in a positive light. He has been highly successful nationally---8th in the country in Developing Grand Prix at the Festival of Champions at Lamplight, first at Dressage at Devon, and in the ribbons every time in the CDI ring at Grand Prix.

What outstanding attributes of a Connemara Pony has this pony brought to the attention of the public this year?

When Gideon shows, the attribute that stands out the most is his character. He has charisma and loads of heart. He demonstrates his intelligence, his trainability and his endless willingness. His rider's trainer has said many, many times that what distinguishes Gideon, what allows him to have reached the level in dressage that he has, is his enormous amount of heart. He also demonstrates his physical ability, strength and movement by competing successfully at the highest level of dressage. He demonstrates a Connemara's willingness and ability to perform the most difficult dressage movements and to be able to be competitive doing that. His rider, JJ Tate, wrote the following about Gideon in a post June 2, 2017: "I'm full of joy when I ride this horse; he is smart, athletic, powerful, cheeky, & so talented! So proud of him & his wonderful representation of such a cool breed! Go Connemarars!" That says it all.

ACPS/USEF Seldom Seen Award

The Seldom Seen Trophy is awarded to the highest placed purebred or Halfbred Connemara ridden by a Junior at USEF Dressage Competitions.

2021 Winner is Drybrook's Annika's Angel

(Drybrook's Moon River x Roscommon Annika)

My name is Claire Piacentini and I am a 16 year old dressage rider from Boston, Massachusetts. This past show season I competed Drybrook's Annika's Angel, owned and trained by Sara Carlisle, at 1st Level and beginning 2nd Level. We are so excited that Annika received the Seldom Seen Award!

She is an amazing mare and truly represents the talent and kindness of Connemara ponies. Drybrook's Annika's Angel, born in 2012, is a 14.3 halfbred Connemara mare by Dry Brook's Moon River and out of Roscommon Annika, bred by Pat Shields of Drybrook Farm.

My trainer, Sara Carlisle, bought her as a 6 year old in 2018 and she has since inspired our love for Connemara ponies! Annika is trained at Lythrum Farm in Acton, Massachusetts. She is currently in training with Sara in Florida for the winter season.

This pony mare has been at the center of my life these last 7 years. I couldn't be more thrilled for Anne, Labras Leannon, to close out her competition career with two 2021 USEF HOTY Year National Championship awards, Halfbred of Eventing and Halfbred of Dressage. As she is easing into retirement I reflect on everything she has brought to my world. The journey has been life changing. The people I have met, the experiences we've had, the places we've traveled too, the opportunities presented to me all because of one "little mare who could". A Forever Home: Part II

Roscommon Fagan

In early 2020, I submitted an article, A Forever Home, on Roscommon Fagan a.k.a Fagan (Baluis Malachi x Larachai's Blue Oak Dunlaith) after being named purebred Connemara Horse of the Year in Dressage. The last sentence I wrote was, "I cannot wait to see what the future brings in both dressage and eventing with my forever pony Fagan!" As a review, Fagan appeared in my life in October 2017, at the age of 13. His breeder and owner of 13 years, Kathleen Fowler was looking for a forever home for him. I was not in the market for an oversize pony with no show record, a huge-loving personality, who appeared to have been eating a lot of groceries.....and so our partnership began

Fast forward, it was our goal to qualify for the 2020 American Eventing Championships (AEC) at the beginner novice level. Fagan and I hit the road, we received our qualifying 2nd place finish in October 2019, in our backyard at Fleur de Leap Horse Trial in Folsom, Louisiana. We were on our quest to complete the two additional required completions with no cross-county faults. Our second completion was earned in February 2020 at Rocking Horse, Horse Trial in Altoona, Florida, then as we all know in March 2020, the country shut down to the COVID pandemic. Upon reopening of USEF competitions in June 2020, we received our third completion at Texas Rose Horse Trials, in Tyler, TX, and we were qualified for the 2020 AEC! Unfortunately, in August 2020, it was announced that the 2020 AEC were cancelled.

The following competition year it was announced that all 2020 AEC qualified riders would be qualified for the 2021 AEC, but they must have one completion with no cross-country faults between April and August. We earned this completion in June 2021 at the Kentucky Horse Park, and we were on our way to the 2021 AEC. Then August 29, 2021, two days before we were scheduled to leave for Lexington, KY, south Louisiana, where we live, was devastated by Hurricane Ida. Following this category 4 hurricane, leaving our farm looked impossible due to the unbelievable number of downed trees, utility poles, and damage. With the help of our neighbors clearing the road, my husband's willingness to stay at home and manage the farm without electricity and my daughter, Emma, who generously offered to go with me, we left on the 14-hour drive to the 2021 AEC arriving one day prior to the beginning of our competition. One of the greatest qualities

of competing in a horse trial, is, it's not over until it was over. There were 51 starters in the Beginner Novice Master Amateur division. After dressage, Fagan and I were in 5th place with a 28.5. Then after cross-country, we moved up to 4th place. This leaving the last phase, show jumping. Show jumping was our weakness, it was pouring, and there was no room for any jumping faults between 1st and 15th place. Having a clear round, I was just elated, thinking we finished 4th at the AEC on a 28.5. Then the third through first place riders all had jumping faults and WE WON!!!! This was a dream come true.

This competition year led Fagan to be the 2021 purebred Connemara Horse of the Year in Eventing as well as USDF All-Breed American Connemara Pony Society Training Level champion, open, amateur, and vintage divisions. During the USEA podcast interview following our AEC win, I was asked what was next for Fagan? I laughed and said, at 17, retirement to my pleasure horse and MY FOREVER PONY!


Together the pair also earned Georgia her USDF Bronze Medal in 2021 as well as placed as a Third Level Junior at Regionals. Oh, Good Grief!

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

Novice Level Purebred Connemara







Piedmont Herman and I experienced both highs and lows through the 2021 year. He and I continued to work on our dressage and he has definitely developed some amazing buttons for lateral work. Our trainer, Suzanne Hughes, doesn't believe in gimmicks or fast fixes. She insists that the work must be done to develop the horse's self carriage and push from the hind. This is often times more of a stretch for me as a rider than for Herman.

During the first half of the year, Herman seemed to struggle with an intermittent mystery soreness. My local vet and I tried to troubleshoot what was going on, suspecting, then eliminating, all of the obvious possibilities (we thought). By the summer, I decided to take Herman down to the Equine Medical Center in Ocala, where Aric Adams gave him a comprehensive evaluation. I learned quite a bit watching Herman trot around with bluetooth sensors on his head, back, and legs. With ultrasound, radiographs, and x-rays, I got to know the insides of Herman's skeleton almost as well as I know the outsides. Dr. Adams' take-away? Herman needed shoes.

Well, I have always been a proponent of the barefoot horse, but when confronted with the possibility that something very serious could have been threatening Herman's soundness, shoeing seemed like such a relief! It wasn't a totally easy fix. It took about 3 months for Herman to get used to moving gracefully in shoes. He wears a size 4 shoe, due to his large draft feet. I'll have to say the difference has been pretty amazing. Best of all, is Herman's willingness to move and knowing he is comfortable working.

Piedmont Herman is by Balmullo's Beacon out of Ruby, a Percheron mare. He was bred by Vanessa Morgan and is owned by my son, Gardner Cook. I feel blessed to be able to ride and show Herman, and we have completed another good year. We recently won Grand Champion First Level Dressage for 2021 in Northeast Florida. Stella

In 2019 I finally had my own forever horse that was by our Stallion, JEF Sir Lancelot. At 63 years of age I was thrilled to purchase this $\frac{3}{4}$ Connemara and $\frac{1}{4}$ Thoroughbred, five year old mare. Cedars Stella Star is a gem. Stella and I have completed 188.75 hours of riding this year! I record our hours for a Horsemanship Rewards program with the Kansas Horse Council so since I already had the information I decided to share it with the Fun With Pony ACPS Achievement Award committee. Stella came to me as a five year old with very limited training or riding; actually just 60 days with a trainer when she was three. So the past three years have been a learning and bonding experience for us both. We've formed a mutually trusting relationship which was particularly demonstrated through two adventures we shared in 2021. We live in a rural part of northeast Kansas called the Flint Hills. Most of our rides are either on and around our farm or within 15 minutes to a couple hours from home but this year we decided to haul to Colorado and ride in the mountains. We are very fortunate to have friends that ride in the Sangria de Cristo Mountains near Westcliffe each year. They joined us for a week of camping at Alvarado Campground. It's a primitive campground located at 9,000 feet. Just getting down to the horse pens and back up to our trailer had me winded! My husband, Bob, was riding his 4 year old halfbred, Irish Gate's Lucky Shamrock, also by Sir Lancelot and out of a Holsteiner mare. We were concerned about the lack of oxygen at the high elevation but the horses never seemed to be effected by it. We were conscious of allowing them to stop whenever they needed a break.

By the end of the week we had logged 30 miles of mountain trails from our camp at 9,000 feet up to Comanche Lake at 12,000. The scenery was special in that it was late September so the Aspens were just beginning to turn. As you can see by the pictures, some of the trails were very steep, narrow and rocky. The bond Stella and I already had was truly cemented throughout the week. Because she was so confident and calm on the Colorado trails I decided our next daring experience would be to ride in the Lawrence Christmas Parade. This parade is one of the most unique in the nation. In its 28th year, this parade features authentic horse-drawn carriages and wagons along with hundreds of mounted riders festively decorated for the season. The parade route is over 2 miles long with massive crowds especially when the weather is mild as it was this year. I worried quite a bit ahead of time that it might be overwhelming for Stella since she's never been anywhere or done anything other than trail riding. I couldn't stop smiling when we rounded the first corner onto Massachusetts Avenue and for the first time she saw and heard the crowd of people lining the route. She took a big inhale and stood motionless for a bit then proceeded on like the amazing Connemara that she is! There were 4 announcers' stands along the length of the parade and the crowds were spilling over the sidewalks onto the road. I couldn't stop smiling and waving to the crowd. We were with a group of 22 riders representing the Kansas Horse Council. I only wished I had a sign or flag so folks would know that she's a Connemara Pony! I don't know yet what 2022 will bring but I've purchased an on-line training program called "99 Challenges" so we will continue to have fun together!


Episode 14 - Ride the Horse You Have Today

You can't wait to get to the barn for your next ride because you've got a fantastic new exercise you saw on YouTube that you want to try out on your pony after work. She's been going pretty well, and you think you're ready to notch it up a step. The hopeful anticipation bubbles in your veins all day, and the moment finally arrives when you put your foot in the stirrup and swing over for another good ride.

Except your pony didn't see that video. And she has other plans, which becomes painfully evident within five minutes. What those plans are remains a mystery, but at this moment they don't include circles - or squares, triangles, or serpentine. What happened to that cool "spiral in and out at the trot" exercise you were hoping for to get her shoulders straighter and that lovely inside leg to outside rein connection? Oh, the injustice!! Is my darling, overly smart pony conspiring against me?

The people from LaLuna Farm where I board Polly left for Florida in December, and I found myself unable to ride after work because nobody was there in the evenings. This was my first winter when I was able to ride Polly, and here I was, foiled again! Last year I was injured so she got most of the winter off, and the previous years she was too young in my mind and I turned her out for the cold months. I found myself gazing longingly at the beautiful indoor, unable to use it. Instead, morning and night, here I was, shoveling, hoisting, and scrubbing with my only reward being very one-sided conversations, (they're much more interesting when we're on a ride) and a lot of brushing. Polly didn't mind this arrangement at all, as being groomed is on her Top 3 list of ways to spend her time - eating and dozing in the sun the other two contenders.

What was I to do? I'm an amateur, I have no Olympic or any other showing aspirations, and I don't even want to ride every day - four



times a week is good in this New York winter weather. But I do want to ride, and Polly needs to keep that overly active brain occupied. At first I thought that spending the winter practicing long-lining would be an option, but doing any activity over and over would not sit well with either of us. Something had to change.

I needed to be at a place where there were people around in the evenings and there were varying riding options - both indoor and outdoor arenas and trails would be great - and multiple disciplines represented so we could work on a little jumping. I also have pretty severe boarding anxiety after a disaster several years ago. Wood fencing, a well-maintained barn, and clean water troughs are high on my list of priorities. If a barn offers you a deal that seems too good to be true, it is. Run.

It seemed like a tall order, but last winter when I was recovering from my broken ankle, I had hobbled in to WillsWay Equestrian Center on my crutches to watch Carol Seaman, from whom I had taken a few lessons, as she gave a musical freestyle clinic. The barn/indoor was new and immaculate, but I hadn't seen what else was there. It was worth a shot. And, it was only 10 minutes from my job.

I moved Polly in on New Year's Eve to stay until my LaLuna crew returns from Florida sometime in April. Julie's comment was, "I don't think you'll last two weeks!" I'll admit the first week or so was rough, and at first the owners even offered to install an extra webcam in Polly's stall for me. But I went over every day after work, and everything was fine. Plus, one of my former students works there, so I felt pretty good, and Polly of course walked in like she owned the place, settled immediately, and seemed very content. She's turned out



every day with another alpha mare owned by my hunting friend Angela, and at first I had reservations, but it seems like Polly and Paprika have worked things out. Near as I can tell, they take turns being in charge. I'm glad she has a buddy, and they have formed a bond. We're in a good place.

Back to the pony training. No, your pony is not conspiring against you. They do not have the ability to analyze the way a human does. Although some days you may be willing to bet money that I'm wrong, your pony does not sit in her stall chewing hay, thinking of ways to obstruct your progress.

Horse Illustrated published a very interesting article called "Understanding Your Horse's Brain" that explained the differences between the horse and human brains. The link is at the end. First, as a percentage of body size, your pony's brain weighs about 2.5 pounds, which is 1/500th of the size of her entire body. In comparison, a human brain weighs about 3 pounds, which is 1/50th of our body mass! I've read that a horse's brain is about the size of a walnut, but that is simply not the case. In addition, the frontal lobe in human and horse brains is vastly different.

Crissi McDonald states:

"It's not that horses don't think like we do," she says. "It's that they can't think like we do. Without a well-developed frontal lobe, horses cannot hold grudges, plot revenge, try to win, plan a way to get out of working or take pleasure in making us mad—even though these are ideas that generations of horsemen have believed, especially during a frustrating experience with a horse."

Back to the day of the "spiral in and out" exercise I was so keen on. I stopped Polly and stood there for a full 2 minutes looking out the arena window at all the snow on the ground, wondering what I was doing wrong. It was cold - definitely in the mid 20s, but the sun was shining. Patience and a sense of humor. I gave a resigned sigh, hopped off, and headed out the back door into the great, snowy outdoors. This turned out to be one of the BEST decisions I've ever made with her.

There was an icy patch by the outside mounting block, so I sucked it up and got on from the ground. She is "only" 14h, so it is definitely doable, and she stands like a rock. I'll take credit for that. :) I headed her out to the field in front of the farm. Despite the fact that the snow was nearly up to her knees, Polly took off at a passage-trot and danced most of the way around the field, breaking into a gallop for the home stretch back to the gate. I'd be lying if I said one hand wasn't in a death grip in her thick mane. When we stopped, I had a strong chat with her to the tune of, "You know, you panting lunatic, it's a lot more work going through this snow at breakneck speed than it is to do some circles in the nice indoor!" Yeah, Yeah, Yeah.

We mosied around the driveways to the back of the barn where there was more snow covered land to explore. Up the rise to the manure container, down the other side, across a small parking lot. And there it was - a perfect snowbank left by the plow, maybe 2'6". I aimed Polly straight at it, up went her ears, and then we were sailing over, landing in previously untrodden snow. Then



came the exuberant buck I've come to expect and a quick turn back around to the lot. OK. Let's do it again! Rinse and repeat three times. Polly was puffing from the exertion, but joyful from it, as well.

On that note, I brought her back inside, overjoyed for a job well done by her. "I told you so!" she seemed to say with her jaunty walk and toss of her head. She's certainly never been shy about expressing her opinions! It wasn't my original plan, but it worked out to be the best possible plan for that day, and I owed it all to my little buckskin menace.

I learned my lesson: Ride The Horse You Have Today!

CONNEMARAS SHINE IN WORKING EQUITATION STANDINGS

Over the last few years, the sport of Working Equitation (WE) has been growing in leaps and bounds, capturing the attention of equestrians from a variety of disciplines, riders on many breeds, including the Connemara. WE events include dressage and Ease of Handling, obstacle work, (EOH) in the introductory division. The higher levels include a speed trial on the obstacle course and in some places, may include cattle work. According to Erin Leal from USAWE, the national organization for Working Equitation events, there are currently 17 Connemaras recorded with USAWE and four of them competed in USAWE rated shows. Others have participated in clinics and non-rated schooling shows. The four competing ponies were, from ACPS Region 3: Aluinn Wyatt, Wildwych Benedict Arnold, and Oakfields Sienna Sparrow. From ACPS Region 8, VSH Devine Alexandra,

Recently USAWE posted their National and Regional leaderboard featuring the top 20 equines in each division and the Connemaras were well represented. Leading the Connemaras, was a newcomer to the sport, Aluinn Wyatt, (HK's Danny Boy x Aladdin's Star Song) a gelding owned and ridden by Barbara Sullivan of Maryland. The pair has been to clinics and had taken lessons before diving into actual competition last year. Their preparation and hard work paid off. At the USAWE Region 6 Championship in September the pair won both the dressage and EOH, trials under two judges, earning them the Region 6 Level 1 Amateur Championship. They also won the Amateur high score dressage and were tied for high score dressage of the show. This boosted the pair in the USAWE standings. In the 2021 Amateur L1-Introductory division they finished 4th in the Nation. They were 1st in USAWE's Region 6 and 5th in Region 7. They also won the USAWE National High Point Connemara award sponsored by Misfit Farm's Trail Equine Level of Excellence Program. Rounding out their 2021 WE success, the pair also earned their silver medal for the ACPS Working Equitation Achievement Award.

Wildwych Benedict Arnold (Wildwych Thunder Snow x Wildwych Valkyrie) owned and ridden by Jody Fontanetta also finished the year well by placing 7th overall in the USAWE Region 6 Open L2 - Novice A. Jody has been competing in WE shows for the past three years, but this was Benedict Arnold's first show season.

Also competing from ACPS Region 3 was the lovely mare, Oakfields Sienna Sparrow (*Hearnesbrook Dunoon x Oakfields Maria Sparrow) ridden by Elaine Meilhan. The pair showed in the Amateur L1- Introductory division.

Competing for a second year was VSH Devine Alexandra (Tullymor's Ned Devine x Missy) a halfbred mare owned and shown by Susan Dudasik of ACPS Region 8. The pair competed in three rated USAWE shows in the Open L1- Introductory division. At the USAWE Region 1 Championship show, they placed 4th in dressage and 2nd in the EOH to finish 3rd in their division at the Region One Championship show. With these successes, they finished 13th nationally and 2nd in the USAWE Region 1 standings. They also earned their bronze medal for the ACPS Working Equitation Achievement Award.

With the growing interest in Working Equitation, the ACPS has added a WE Achievement Award to their Lifetime Achievement Awards program. USAWE also offers a USAWE National High Point Connemara award sponsored by Misfit Farm's Trail Equine Level of Excellence Program.

10 Most Common Inspection Questions

The ACPS Inspections Program has been functioning since the mid 1990s. The ICCPS, the International Committee of Connemara Pony Societies, the global group of Connemara Pony Societies around the world, is dedicated "To develop and maintain the Connemara Pony as a distinct breed in accordance with the aims and objectives of the CPBS by promoting and fostering high standards of breeding". Inspection of ponies by each Society is the means by which breeding animals are evaluated with respect to the Breed Standard. The ACPS became a member of the ICCPS in 2004 and thanks to the work of the Inspections Committee and Inspectors, the Connemara Pony in the US continues to be one of the most popular breeds, being enjoyed by many people in a variety of disciplines. Our ACPS Mission Statement includes "To preserve the unique qualities of the breed".

For the past 28 years, the ACPS Inspectors have inspected many, many ponies. That being said, the majority Connemara Pony population in the US has been inspected. Several years ago, we saw a decrease in foal births, mainly due to economics and therefore the number of ponies coming of age for inspection, has decreased. The reduction in the pool of ponies yet to be inspected, is a good thing actually. But some challenges have arisen when it comes to the Inspection process, that were not present when the program was first established. First of all, one of the policies in place for scheduling an Inspection is a minimum of 10 ponies. This number was determined based on the travel and lodging expenses for the Inspection Team. In today's world, we all know that travel costs have increased and travel has become less reliable, especially air travel - posing another set of challenges when it comes to Inspections. The Nomination of 10 ponies factors into this as we have observed that it is becoming more difficult to find an area where there are 10 ponies ready to be Inspected. Second, with the size of the ACPS Regions and the distribution of members, coordinating a site and date, let alone the ease of travel for the members bringing a pony to Inspection brings yet another set of challenges. Geographic barriers such as mountains or large driving distances between hubs of pony populations, not to mention the rising cost of fuel, stabling and all the other expenses associated with taking a pony away from home factor into the decision whether or not to have a pony Inspected. Recently, questions from pony owners regarding the Inspection process, have been asked and it is a good time to take a look at some of them.

Here are the 10 most commonly asked questions regarding ACPS Inspections.

1. HEIGHT: "My pony is 15.1 H and when I look up information about the height of Connemara ponies I find 14.3 is mentioned. So I guess my pony won't pass inspection"

When an Inspection Team looks at a pony they are working through a series of characteristics from the Breed Standard. The categories include: Type, Conformation, Movement, Temperament. Height is part of the Inspection and historically ponies have exhibited a range of heights. If you look back through the Stud Books from both the CPBS and the ACPS, you will find many different heights. The Veterinary Report Form, the document brought on the Day of Inspection and completed by the owner's veterinarian, has a place for the pony's height to be recorded. Another important place where a pony's height is recorded is on the Permanent Registration Papers of the pony. There

are spots for the height to be recorded at 2 years AND at 5 years. So what if a 15.1 H pony is Nominated for Inspection? One of the items the Inspection Team is looking to see is if the pony is "substantially proportionate to the height" - is the bone and substance of the pony enough to support the height? The Inspectors measure the bone of the pony at the cannon bone and this provides a means by which substance can be observed.

My example is.....say you saw a 17H horse and the bone measurement was 6 1/2 inches, then the limbs could not really support the bulk of the body. "Over height" is not a concern as long as there is substance for support, the breed type is present and the other characteristics observed upon presentation for Inspection, are that of a recognizable Connemara Pony type.

2. REFUND: "I Nominated my pony for Inspection and my schedule changed and I cannot make the inspection. OR I sold the pony I nominated for Inspections. Can I get a refund?"

No refunds are offered through the ACPS Inspections. However, if a pony dies prior to inspection another pony may be substituted in the Nominated pony's place. If a pony is sold before its Inspection, then the Nomination carries over to the new owner and they have the option to have the pony Inspected. It is very important to make sure the Inspections Committee knows if a Nominated pony has been sold prior to its inspection so that the new owner can be contacted to let them know the pony is eligible for Inspection. If a pony has experienced an injury resulting in lameness, whether permanent or temporary, allowances are made the day of Inspection.

3. TURNOUT: "Do I have to pull my ponies mane, trim feathers, what equipment do I need? OR.....I'm competing in a show and my pony's inspection will be after my ridden classes. There are sweat marks on my pony or the mane is braided. What do I do?"

Ponies should be shown in their natural state, that being said, if a pony is being competed and the mane is pulled or "furnishings" (aka whiskers, bridle paths, feathers) have been neatened because of the show discipline, that is fine. If an Inspection is being held in conjunction with a show, then it is understood that a pony might show evidence of a performance class - sweat marks, a braided mane. BOTH the pony and handler should come to Inspections ready to stand the pony quietly for static observation by the Inspection Team, and then be able to walk and trot the pony to and from the Inspection Team. Either a halter or bridle may be used, the handler should wear footwear that allows for the in hand movement of the pony (spurs should be removed). In some cases the pony might be asked to exhibit movement at liberty. This does not involve the pony being chased around but rather the Inspection Team often finds that free movement is a less inhibited way to observe the pony's movement.

4. STALLIONS: "I have a stallion/stallion prospect. Must he be inspected before it can be used for breeding? I have two registered stallions, and they got into the pasture with my mares? Now I have foals on the way, who's the sire?"

The ACPS Registers every pony of known parentage and the DNA of a pony is part of its identity. Therefore, no a stallion does not

have to be inspected prior to use as a breeding animal. However, it is good to have all animals used for breeding, inspected. The Inspection Team will provide the Inspection Report Form, providing the owner with the observations the day of Inspection. Once the pony has been “approved”, the pony is listed in the “List of Inspected and Approved Connemara Ponies” which compiles with the requirements for membership in the ICCPS. The parentage of ponies can be determined through DNA, which is part of the ACPS Registration process.

5. MARE WITH FOAL AT FOOT: “My mare has had a foal and it is not weaned yet. Can she still be inspected? Do I need to halter break my foal and have someone else lead the foal while I handle the mare?”

The ACPS is a Breed Society and so it is great to see mares and foals. Yes, certainly a mare can be inspected with a foal at foot. No, the foal does not have to be halter trained and a second handler is not required. The foal can move at liberty and be allowed to nurse. The only issue with bringing a foal to inspections is to make sure that the inspection venue is safe and “foal proof” as foals are very curious.

6. PREMIUM: “I’ve nominated my mare for Inspection. During the Inspection process, the Inspector Team asked me if the mare has ever had a foal? Why.....”

The ACPS has a Premium program which recognizes outstanding representatives of the Connemara Breed. Being a Breed Society, proceeding offspring is essential. If the Inspection Team feels that the pony being inspected might meet the criteria for Premium, they will go back to the pony owner and gather more information about the pony on the day of Inspection. If it is the pony’s first Inspection, and the pony is designated Premium, there is no additional fee charged, if a pony was presented for its initial inspection, say before it produced offspring, then the standard Nomination Fees apply. If, at a later point in the pony’s life, once it has produced offspring, the owner feels the pony might be considered for Premium Status, then the pony is Nominated for Premium and an Inspection Team will perform a second Inspection of the pony. There is a fee charged for the second Inspection of a pony for Premium.

7. RE-PRESENTATION: “I presented my pony for Inspection and it was not approved. I’m devastated and mad. What should I do?” In many cases, when an Inspection Team asks a pony to be Re-presented (THE TERM FAIL IS INCORRECT) they may feel that the pony is immature and would be better suited to be brought back when older. Connemaras are a late maturing breed. Sometimes owners are excited about having their pony inspected when they have the opportunity, but often a pony needs a few years to grow into itself and it is best to wait until another opportunity in the future for Inspections. In most cases, the pony will not receive remarks/comments from the Inspection team. The owner will be advised of this decision and the reasons why. IF HOWEVER, in rare cases, a pony is not a good representative of the Connemara pony breed, it is difficult for the Inspection Team to inform an owner, but the results are explained. The Inspection Program’s function is to maintain the Breed Standard and even though careful thought and planning is put into breeding ponies, not all crosses result in the pony of one’s dreams.

8. HALFBRED: “I have a great halfbred, who is recognizable as a Connemara Pony. Can I have it Inspected?”

There are many challenges with Inspecting halfbreds, the operative word here being HALF. What is that half? Breed characteristics are expressed in many different ways and it often is a challenge to try and separate out the ways in which genes are combined. Enjoy your halfbred and promote it as a Connemara.

9. AGE: “I’ve just bought my first Connemara Pony and Inspections will be in my Region. Should I Nominate my 2 yr old for Inspection?”

Connemaras are a late maturing breed and although some individuals seem well put together as 2-3 yr olds, often times another couple of years makes a big difference in the appearance and maturity of a pony. We get excited when our Connemaras offer to do their job so willingly and cooperate in their training, but physically they are still immature. Ask other Connemara owners and breeders you know or ask an Inspector for their input regarding the timing for nominating your youngster for Inspection.

10. IDENTITY: “I just bought my first pony or sadly got a pony from a rescue that is a “Connemara”. How can I really know whether my pony is who it is? I have papers but My pony isn’t microchipped. My pony has a brand.”

As part of the Registration process for the ACPS, the identity/parentage of ponies is verified through DNA. We now microchip foals. BUT many times owners either misplace the microchip or never have it implanted. There are LOTS of grey ponies in the Connemara breed. Part of the Inspections process is to verify the identity of the pony. Early in the history of the program this was done by comparing the facial and leg markings observed on ponies. But as grey ponies mature, often those markings are no longer distinguishable. During the Inspection process, the pony will be scanned to see if a microchip is present. Then the number is compared to the microchip number recorded on the Permanent Registration papers for the pony. If you are nominating an older pony for Inspection who DOES NOT have a microchip, the Inspections Committee recommends you obtain one from the Registrar and have it implanted when your veterinarian comes out to do the Veterinarian Report Form PRIOR to inspection. We would like to think that there is not theft of ponies or cases of mistaken identity that occur, but it is in everyone’s best interest to make sure that we keep our pony’s safe and one way to easily do this, is via a microchip. If a pony has been branded and there is documentation specific to the brand, it is a good idea for a copy to be submitted when the Nomination is made.

The Inspections Committee works together with pony owners, show managers, Regional Chairs, Regional Governors, and other interested parties to schedule Inspections. Locations and dates are arranged with input from many different sources. Early thought and planning allows for the Inspection Teams to arrange travel. Region IX





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
